

Remains of Father and Son Who Died Same Day Laid Away in Calvary Cemetery Yesterday.

St. Vincent's Church yesterday morning was the scene of one of the largest funerals ever conducted in Los Angeles. It was that over the remains of Louis Sentous, Sr., and his son, Jules J. Sentous, who died within twelve hours last Wednesday.

The elder Sentous had lived here more than half a century, and several hundred of the oldest families were represented at the services.

The pall bearers for Louis Sentous were Caspare Cohn, Judge Hutton, Camille Marquet, ex-Sheriff Burns, F. Graziade, Jules Viote, James Jauffaud, president of the French Benevolent Society, of which Sentous was one of the founders in 1868; A. Blanchard of the Legion of France, P. Bertrand and P. Etcharbies. Those who bore the casket of Jules J. Sentous were J. M. Larronde, Peter Amestoy, Edward Gibbs, Antoine Peres, Peter Puissegur and F. Charconier. Louis Sentous, Jr., French Vice-Consul, was in charge of the details of the funeral.

The impressive ceremony of the Requiem Mass became doubly so when the caskets containing the remains of father and son were set before the altar and hundreds of floral offerings were banked around them. There were more than a hundred set pieces in the flower tributes.

Rev. Mr. McDonald conducted the mass and Prof. Wilde was in charge of music. At the conclusion of the ceremony the bodies were taken to Calvary Cemetery, where after the church ritual, the French Benevolent Society held a short ceremony preceding the interment.
