

W. S. Biscailuz rites Monday

William S. Biscailuz, uncle of Sheriff E. W. Biscailuz, died yesterday at the home of a daughter in Whittier, and will be buried Monday after services in the old Plaza church where he was christened 79 years ago.

Born near what is now the busy intersection of Wilshire blvd. and Fairfax ave., on April 17, 1864, William Biscailuz witnessed the growth of Los Angeles from pueblo to metropolis.

Early in youth his family moved to a farm near Chatsworth, where he spent his boyhood. He was educated at old St. Vincent's college, which stood at Seventh st. and Broadway, and was married in the San Fernando mission.

His parents were John Biscailuz, a pioneer who came to California from the south of France, and Mrs. Juanita Biscailuz, who was a Lopez of one of the old San Fernando valley landholding families.

For more than 30 years Biscailuz was employed by the Standard-Oil Co. at Newhall.

Besides Mrs. Lawrence W. Colton, at whose home, 515 East Penn st., Whittier, he died, Biscailuz is survived by eight of his eleven children.

They are Mrs. Theodore Cooke, Long Beach; Miss Honoria Biscailuz, Los Angeles; Mrs. Marvin Kirkwood, Whittier; Mrs. George Curl, Santa Paula; William Biscailuz Jr., Huntington Beach; Valentine Biscailuz, Westminster; Roland Biscailuz, Los Angeles, and Raymond Biscailuz, Torrance.

A sister, Mrs. Charles Kandt, lives at Bakersfield.
