

WILLIAM J. BISCAILUZ, UNCLE OF SHERIFF, DIES

William J. Biscailuz, uncle of Sheriff E. W. Biscailuz, died yesterday at the home of a daughter, Mrs. Lawrence W. Colton,

515 E. Penn St., Whittier. Mr. Biscailuz was 79.

Born in the approximate area of Wilshire Blvd. and La Brea Ave. when that part of the Southland was but a wilderness, Mr. Biscailuz was baptized in the Old Plaza Church and attended St. Vincent's College and Santa Clara College.

He had been associated with the Standard Oil Co. for more than 30 years before his retirement several years ago.

His wife, whom he married in the San Fernando Mission, passed away four years ago. He leaves eight other children, Mrs. Theodore Cooke, Miss Honoriac Biscailuz, William J. Biscailuz, Valentine, Roland and Raymond Biscailuz, Mrs. George Curl and Mrs. Marvin Kirkwood, and a sister, Mrs. Charles Kandt of Bakersfield.

MINERS GET ULTIMATUM

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James F. Byrnes a request that the government compel the U.M.W. to sign a contract, as ordered by W.L.B., or punish it for refusing.
