

Pedestrian city's 3rd traffic fatality

Mrs. Juana Arrosagarey, 60-year-old Chino resident, became the city's third traf-fic fatality of the year when she was struck in a cross-walk while returning home from Christmas shopping.

Mrs. Arrosagarey was knocked 66 feet after a car hit her in the crosswalk at Central and Washington at approximately 3:45 p.m., last Thursday. Driver of the vehicle was Eli Pershing Rhodes, 49, of Ontario, an employe at the California Institution for Men.

She died three hours later at San Antonio Community hospital.

Police said a complaint for manslaughter charges is being sought from the dis-

mr. Rhodes was south-bound on Central avenue. He told police he did not see Mrs. Arrosogaray until his automobile struck her.

Mrs. Arrosogaray, who lived at 13137 Ninth street, was born in Spain, Jan. 9, 1907 and came to Chino four years ago from Argen. tina
