ident, said the Misses Batz were chosen because of their historical associ-ation with the campus and their long-standing interest in university activities. He added their selection seemed especially appropriate during the bicentennial year.

The Batz sisters were born in the late 1800s on a ranch, which today is the site of Cal State. They still live in a hillside house overlooking the campus.

Their grandparents immigrated to Los Angeles in 1850, the same year California was admitted to the Union, and acquired an adobe house built in 1776 by Franciscan missionaries.

The Batz family eventually owned the 3,300-acre Rancho Rosa Castilla, which covered all or part of the pres-ent communities of El Sereno, Monterey Park, Alhambra, Montebello, Lincoln Heights, Belvedere and City Terrace.

The Batz sisters were born in an adobe house, which stood where Cal State's King Hall classroom building now stands. The adobe was sold in 1906 to a developer and destroyed by fire in 1908.

Some 2,700 donors provided \$279,-000 in contributions for scholarships and other campus activities during last year's drive.
