

LAST RITES FOR PIONEER TO BE TODAY

*Mrs. Louis Sentous, Who
Died at Home Here, Came
to Southland When Baby*

Funeral services for Mrs. Louis Sentous, 58 years of age, member of one of the oldest and most widely known of the early California families, who died at her home, 241 South Windsor Boulevard, Wednesday night of heart disease following an illness of thirty days' duration, will be conducted today at 9:30 a.m. from the residence and at 10 p.m. from St. Brendan's Cathedral at Third street and Van Ness avenue. Burial will be in Calvary Cemetery.

Mrs. Sentous, who before her marriage was Marie Amestoy, was born in France and was brought to Southern California by her parents when she was only 21 months of age. She had twelve brothers and sisters, all of whom were born after the family came to make a home in Southern California. The family home in the early days was in the San Fernando Valley on a 4500-acre site known as the Encino ranch. Mrs. Sentous had always maintained a great interest in the French colony here, among whose members she numbered many friends. Throughout her life she had taken an active part in the affairs of the French Society of Los Angeles.

Her husband, Louis Sentous, also is a member of one of the old families, his people having come here to settle in 1854. For eighteen years Mr. Sentous served in the capacity of French Consul in this city.

In addition to her husband, Mrs. Sentous leaves one son, Jean Emile Sentous.
