

Bishop Sailor Dies of Wounds

BISHOP, Calif., Nov. 21.—War dispatches from Washington, D.C., this week informed Mr. and Mrs. John Laxague of Bishop that their son, Pfc. George Laxague, had died on Oct. 29 from wounds received the previous day in Germany. He was serving with a tank destroyer unit when wounded.

Pfc. George Laxague was one of boy triplets born on Armistice day in 1918. His triplet brothers, Willie and Albert, are assisting the family with their stock raising operations.

He is survived by thirteen brothers and sisters. Two other brothers are in the service, Pfc. Domique, now stationed at Camp Roberts, Calif., and Pfc. Emil, with the armed forces in England. Another brother, John, was honorably discharged after a year's service in the army and is making his home with his parents, as are the sixth and seventh brothers. Augustine and Frank.

In addition to brothers, he is survived by two sisters, Misses Christine and Clara Belle, who live with their parents, and four married sisters, Mrs. Gladys Ohyagaray of Stockton, Calif., Mrs. Margaret Galvin of Benton, Calif., Mrs. Emilio Carbago of Bishop, and Mrs. Antone Saldubehere of Mono Lake, Calif.
