Sheriff's Mother Succumbs at 72

Funeral Services for Mrs. Hunter to Be on Saturday

Funeral services for the mother of Sheriff Biscailuz, Mrs. Ida Warren Hunter, 72 years of age, who died early yesterday morning at the Biscailuz home in Santa Monica, will be conducted at 10 a.m. Saturday at St. Thomas Church in Pico Heights.

Rosary will be said at 8 p.m. tomorrow by Rev. John J. Gallagher at the W. A. Brown Mortuary, 1815 South Flower street, and burial will be in Valhalla Cemetery in the family plot beside her husband, Capt. Jesse Hunter, who died seven years ago.

CAME WITH PADRES

Mrs. Hunter's ancestors came to California from Spain with the Mission padres. Her grandfather was Chito Lopez, once favored by the King of Spain with vast grants of land about Lake Hughes and Lake Elizabeth. Her father was William (Billy) Warren, who was elected city marshal and chief of police here in 1860. A decade later he was slain in a gun duel with Joe Dye as the climax of a bitter political feud which rocked the Southland.

She was born November 8, 1865, in the family home which stood on the present site of the Hall of Records.

MISSION BUILDER

The pioneer's mother was Juanita Lopez, whose grandfather was superintendent of the construction of the San Gabriel Mission and his grave is located there.

Besides Sheriff Biscailuz, the only living child resulting from her marriage to Martin Biscailuz, she leaves two sons and a daughter, Warren Hunter, James Hunter and Mrs. Carol Flewelling, all of Los Angeles.

Her first husband, an attorney, died in 1898 and she later married Capt. Hunter, who served as chief of detectives under three Los Angeles county district attorneys.

Her home was at 2964 West Fifteenth street.
